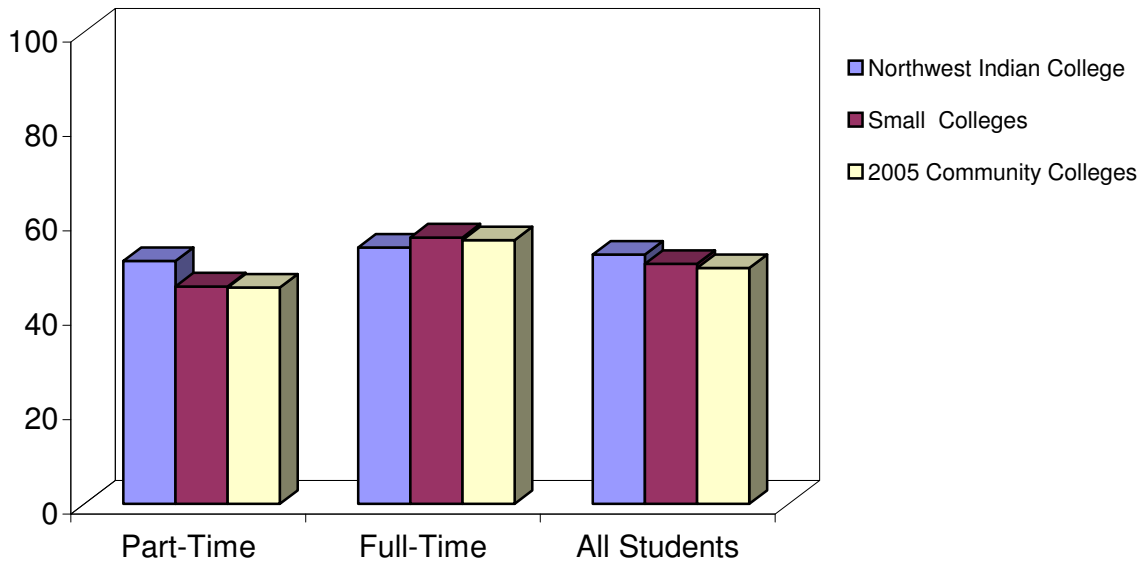


Active and Collaborative Learning by Enrollment Status

- 4a. Asked questions in class or contributed to class discussions
- 4b. Made a class presentation (**full-time students only -**)
- 4f. Worked with other students on projects during class
- 4g. Worked with classmates outside of class to prepare class assignments
- 4h. Tutored or taught other students (paid or voluntary)
- 4i. Participated in a community-based project as a part of a regular course (**all students +**)
- 4r. Discussed ideas from readings or classes with others outside of class (students, family members, co-workers, etc.)
